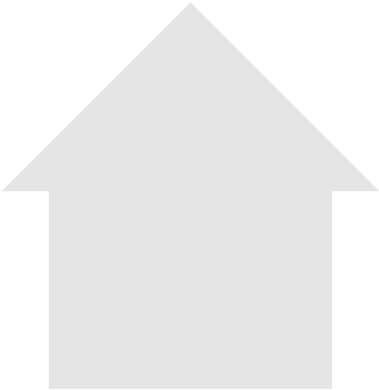


# STATEWIDE ATTAINMENT GOALS

**100% of adults\* will have a high school diploma or equivalent.**



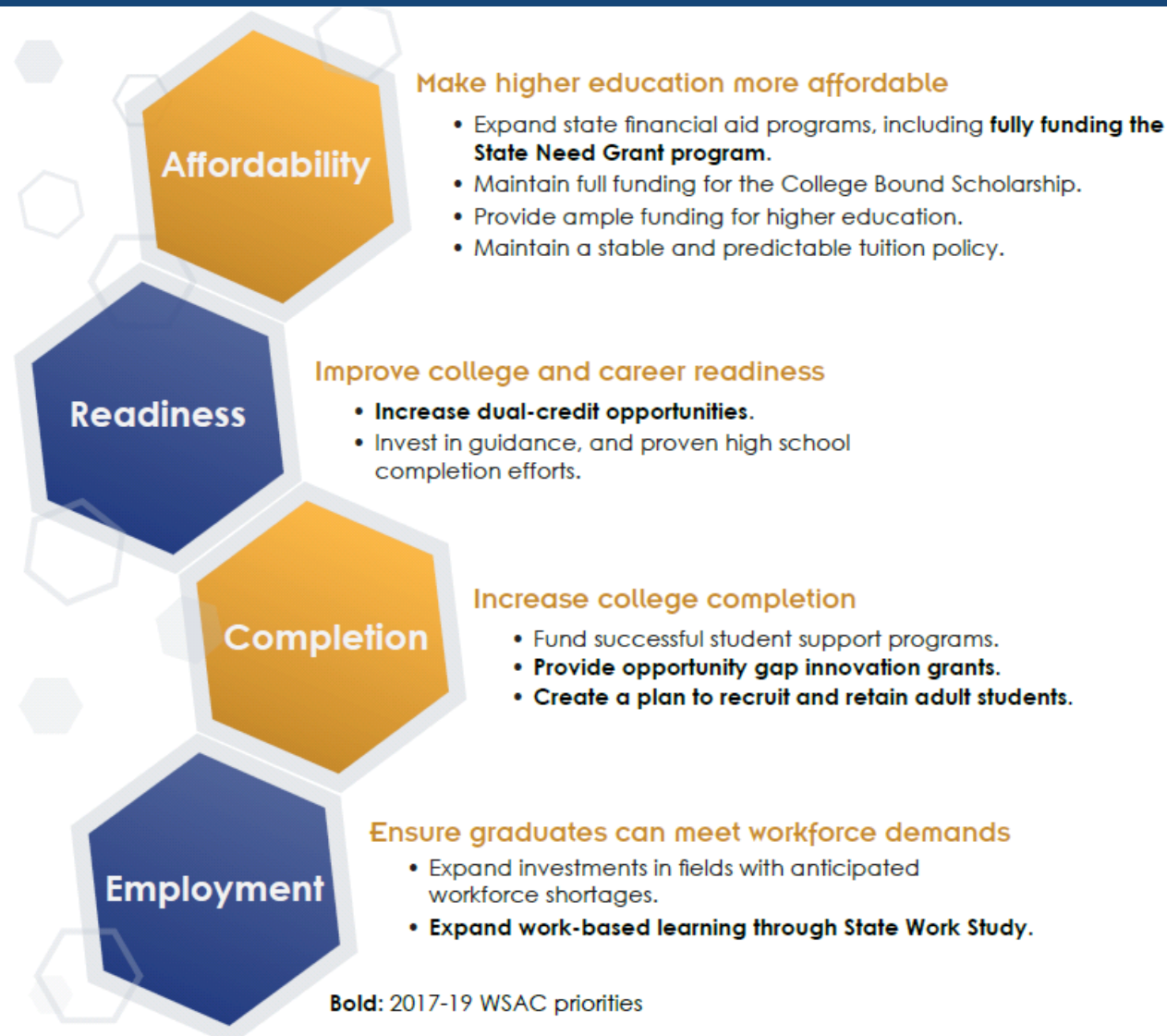
**At least 70% of adults\* will have a postsecondary credential.**

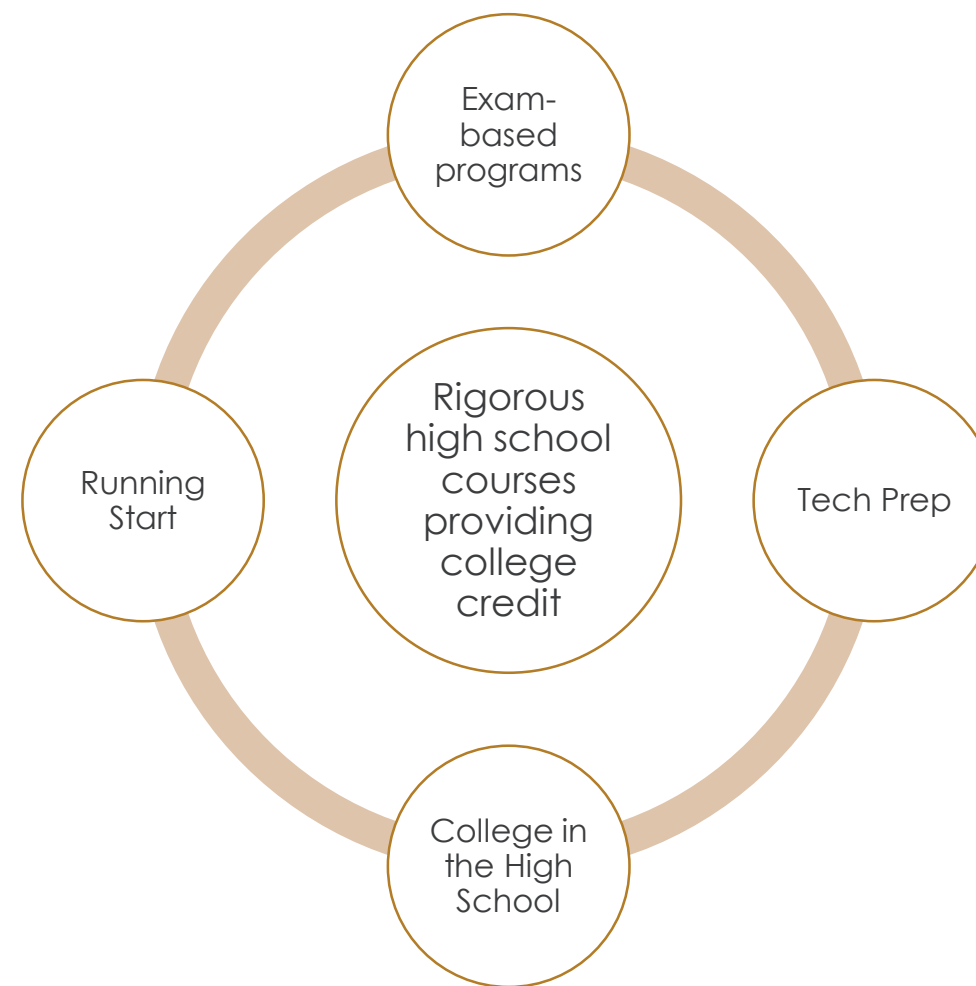

# DUAL CREDIT LEADS TO POSTSECONDARY OPPORTUNITY

Dual-credit students are more likely to meet college readiness benchmarks, enter college—and enter shortly after high school graduation—and they are less likely to place into remedial English or math.

They have higher first year college GPAs, second year college retention rates, and higher four- and six-year college completion rates.

## WASHINGTON STATE

WSAC administers this **direct service** grant to 27 low-income districts, serving 8,000 students and their families.

In collaborations with UW and CSF, GEAR UP provides professional college readiness trainings to school staff, counselors and leaders.

## GEAR UP Program objectives

- Increase academic performance and preparation for postsecondary education.
- Increase high school graduation and postsecondary participation rates.
- Increase students' and their families' knowledge of postsecondary options, preparation, and finances.
