





- Children of parents with a degree are more likely to attain a degree.
- Need for career exploration and relevant labor market information.
- Role models—especially if they look like the students.

- Make instruction relevant through applied & project-based learning.
- Earning while learning may enhance completion rates for many.
- Help students consider and prepare for internships and alternative postsecondary options, apprenticeship and on-the-job training.
