1. Review of Purpose of CSS

a. Develop recommendations related to supporting all students, increasing information and encouraging adults.

2. Student Support Presentation from OSPI (PPT)

- Building Bridges 2007 workgroup developed statewide recommendations to reduce dropout and improve reengagement
 - i. Set a goal and coordinate efforts to achieve it
 - ii. Build systems and practices at every grade level
 - iii. Create retrieval system
- b. GATE collective impact imitative created in 2011 to increase graduation rates (Graduation: A Team Effort)
 - i. Common agenda and shared measurement
 - ii. Mutually reinforced activities and continuous communication
 - iii. Backbone supports
- c. Goal to increase graduation rates by 2 percentage points by 2018 (Results WA)

3. 2015 Student Support Committee Work Plan

As the metrics are developed to gage progress toward the Roadmap goals, CSS can continue to implement initiatives and develop recommendations.

- a. CSS Principles developed in last meeting
 - i. Support proposals should be data-driven.
 - ii. Services should be well-coordinated.
 - iii. Strategies to address opportunity gaps should be intentional.

b. CSS Work Plan – within current resources

- Develop communication strategies to share information with schools, nonprofit organizations, students, and parents.
 - 1. Determine the best method of delivery (social media, text, web, blog, flyers, etc.) and critical players (parents/teachers/counselors) to share information with
 - 2. Leverage use of the Ready, Set, Grad website and ensure information is relevant and current.
- ii. Create mechanisms to link activities to the High School and Beyond plan wherever possible.
- iii. Engage in the work of Reach Higher, developing college- and career-readiness initiatives in K-12.
- Offer training and professional development that address student support across the educational spectrum.
- v. Develop methods to ensure all student support strategies are intentional about addressing the opportunity gaps in academic achievement.
