Encourage adults to earn a postsecondary credential.

Provide tailored information regarding continuing education and provide support to adults, especially those with some postsecondary credits but no credential.

Make it scalable, sustainable, and cost effective.

Highlight local and regional efforts for returning adults.

Consider institutions' business and enrollment management practices.






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## Vision for user experience in portal




- Users interact with the site based on their background and goals

- Contact information will be provided to participating institutions
















Share effective practices that support adult learners.
