Week 2: January 20-26, 2014

The second week of the 60-day Supplemental Session was mostly focused on public hearings on legislation in policy committees, with some committees beginning to vote bills out of committees and on to the next phase of the legislative process. In terms of legislative action related to the Council's Roadmap work, most noteworthy was the introduction of HB 2626, the bill that puts the Roadmap attainment goals in statute, sponsored by Representatives

<u>Seaquist</u>, <u>Haler</u>, <u>Reykdal</u>, <u>Gregerson</u>, <u>Pollet</u>, <u>Moscoso</u>. The bill is scheduled for a public hearing in the House Higher Education Committee (JLOB Building, House Hearing Room A) at 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday, January 29th.

Council members were busy in Olympia during the second week of session, with very successful meetings with Governor Inslee and House Majority Leader Pat Sullivan. Three of the Council's Governor-appointed members (Maud, Jeff and Nauman) also received confirmation hearings in the Senate Higher Education Committee as part of the Senate confirmation process specified under RCW 28B.77.005.

Higher education bills pass House

On Friday, the House passed a number of higher education-related bills off the House Floor:

House Higher Education Committee

This week the House Higher Education Committee held public hearings on several bills, including three measures that the Council publically supported in testimony due to their alignment with the Roadmap strategy to streamline and expand dual-credit and dual-enrollment programs:

 HB 2285 - Requiring a review of institution of higher education policies related to dual credit coursework.

- HB 2383 Integrating career and college readiness standards into K-12 and higher education policies and practices.
- HB 2396 Addressing barriers for students to participate in the running start program.

The committee also held work sessions on "higher education performance and results" this week, with a presentation from the SBCTC on their nationally-recognized <u>Student Achievement Initiative</u>, as well as presentations from the <u>Technical Incentive Funding Model Task Force</u> and the six public baccalaureate institutions on their proposals for an incentive funding system in higher education.

House Education Committee

The Council also signed-in in support of <u>HB 2181</u>- authorizing and supporting career and college ready graduation requirements adopted by the State Board of Education, during the House Education Committee's public hearing on the measure this week. The Council will be supporting a similar measure in the Senate Early Learning & K-12 Education Committee next week that is also closely aligned with the Roadmap strategies related to ensuring students are college and career-ready.

Senate Higher Education Committee

The Senate Higher Education Committee began the week with confirmation hearings for three of the five Governor-appointed Council members. On Tuesday, Maud Daudon, Jeff Charbonneau, and Rai Nauman Mumtaz testified in front of the Committee and answered members' questions about why they want to serve on the Council and what they think are some of the most pressing issues in education policy today. Following their testimony, the Council's Executive Director, Gene Sharratt and the Council's representative to the four-year public baccalaureate institutions, Paul Francis, joined the other Council members for a presentation of the Roadmap to the Committee. Similar to the House Higher Education Committee, the Senate Higher Education Committee also held work sessions related to performance funding this week, with a presentation from the SBCTC on their nationally-recognized Student Achievement Initiative, as well as presentations from the Technical Incentive Funding Model Task Force and the six public baccalaureate institutions on their proposals for an incentive funding system in higher education.
