

# **Governor Inslee Signs Bill Endorsing Roadmap Education Goals for 2023**

**Olympia**— Washington is one important step closer to increasing educational attainment for students and workers. Today, Governor Inslee signed <u>ESHB 2626</u>, which acknowledges and endorses the planning targets proposed by the Washington Student Achievement Council in its <u>Ten-Year Roadmap Report</u>. The two educational attainment goals for 2023 are:

- All adults ages 25-44 will have a high school diploma or equivalent, and
- 70 percent of adults ages 25-44 will have a postsecondary credential.

The Senate unanimously passed the bill on March 7 and the House concurred with the Senate amendments in a 96-2 vote for final passage on March 11. Washington will now join other states, including Oregon and California, in establishing goals for increasing educational attainment in state law.
