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

Week 1 Legislative Update January 20, 2015

Higher Education Work Sessions

On January 13, the House Higher Education Committee held a work session titled "Higher Education System Part 1." Washington Student Achievement Council Vice Chair Karen Lee presented with Executive Director Gene Sharratt and Director of Policy and Government Relations Maddy Thompson.

The presentation highlighted WSAC's Strategic Action Plan, which is the foundation of the Council's 2015 legislative agenda. Members discussed institutional capacity and State Need Grant funding.

The work session included an overview of the state's higher education system presented by Office of Program Research staff in the House. Paul Francis, executive director of the Council of Presidents and Council member, presented on behalf of the public baccalaureate institutions. Michele Johnson, chancellor of Pierce Colleges presented with Marty Brown, executive director of the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges and Council member, on behalf of the community and technical college system.

Dual Credit

On January 14, the Senate Early Learning and K-12 Education Committee held hearings on two dual-credit proposals: <u>SB 5080</u> sponsored by Senator Dammeier and <u>SB 5086</u>, which is sponsored by Committee Chair, Senator Litzow and is an Office of Financial Management Request bill. Both bills would expand access to the College in the High School program with Senator Litzow's proposal prioritizing access for low-income students. Senate staff to the committee presented a <u>side by side comparison of the bills</u>.

Washington Student Achievement Council Director of Academic Affairs and Policy Randy Spaulding and Associate Director Noreen Light presented on dual-credit award by exam programs, followed by a dual-credit presentation by Joyce Hammer of the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges.

Other Highlights

Hearings were held in the House and Senate on the Governor's budget, <u>HB 1106</u>, in House Appropriations on Monday January 12 with a focus on the education and higher education portions of the budget. The Senate heard the proposal on <u>SB 5077</u> on January 14.

On January 15, Senate Ways and Means held a public hearing on <u>SB 5063</u> - Prioritizing state revenue growth for education.

The Senate Early Learning and K-12 Committee also held a work session that included an overview of the Early Childhood Education and Assistance Program (ECEAP) and an update on the ECEAP Expansion Plan to serve all eligible children by the 2018-19 school year presented by the Department of Early Learning. The Washington Institute of Public Policy Outcome also presented their evaluation of ECEAP.

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Week 2 Legislative Update January 19-23, 2015

Senate Work Sessions

In the **Senate Higher Education Committee** meeting on January 20, Maud Daudon, the Washington Student Achievement Council (WSAC) Chair and CEO and President of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, presented the <u>WSAC Strategic Action Plan</u>, which forms the basis of WSAC's legislative agenda for 2015. Ms. Daudon, presenting with Gene Sharratt, Executive Director, and Maddy Thompson, Director of Policy and Government Relations, thanked Chair Bailey and members of the committee for supporting higher education and requested continued support in 2015 to make progress on the state goals for education attainment.

The committee heard from Rachelle Sharpe, WSAC's Senior Director of Financial Aid, on the <u>State Need</u> <u>Grant report</u>. Recommendations to the <u>Legislature</u> include:

- Close the funding gap to serve more students.
- Establish the state's policy goal and improve predictability.
- Make the less-than-half time enrollment category permanent.

Eleni Papadakis presented on the Workforce Board's regulation of private career schools. Ms. Papadakis noted that the recent issues surrounding Corinthian-owned Everest Colleges were less severe at the six campuses in Washington due to relatively stringent oversight in place in this state.

A fourth presentation focused on the State Auditor's Office audit of the University of Washington's use of dedicated local and operating fee accounts.

Proposal to Improve Coordination of the State Need Grant and College Bound

On January 21, the **Senate Ways and Means Committee** held a work session focusing on higher education budget issues. The work session included information on the Governor's budget proposal related to improving coordination between College Bound (CB) and the State Need Grant (SNG). Paula Moore of OFM explained that the Governor's budget builds off the current policy to coordinate SNG-and CB-award packaging. The coordination rates vary by sector and by school. The Governor's proposal will create a centralized step through WSAC and assumes a saving of \$23 million that would be reinvested in SNG.

Rachelle Sharpe (WSAC) explained that the requirement to serve CB students first reflects the way the program was designed, where CB is an early commitment of the State Need Grant (SNG) and then CB fills the gap to the maximum award based on public tuition plus a small book stipend of \$400. This proposal would have WSAC set aside SNG funding for CB students and then distribute it following student enrollments. No CB students would be affected by this change; only the funding source would be altered. Since the savings to the CB program would be re-invested in SNG, it is not anticipated that

the unserved population would grow as a result of this change. Kay Lewis of the University of Washington and Scott Copeland of SBCTC presented their perspectives on the issue.

A panel on tuition-setting authority included comments from Marty Brown, WSAC member and Executive Director of the State Board for Community and Technical College, who noted that the Legislature retains authority to set the tuition cap for community and technical colleges. Tuition is \$4,000 throughout the community and technical college system and has remained at this level since 2013 due to the tuition freeze imposed during the last two legislative sessions. Mr. Brown noted that no new state funding and no tuition increase is a reduction because the colleges do not get any inflation increase for the non-employee related costs. These costs amount to \$22 million for the next two years based on 2 percent inflation. Another link to tuition is compensation increases. Historically, the state has provided compensation increases through the general fund. This is not the case in the Governor's budget proposal.

Paul Francis, WSAC member and Executive Director of the Council of Presidents, emphasized that instead of focusing on who should be setting tuition we should be focusing on providing stable and predictable funding to allow our students to receive a high quality degree at an affordable cost. He said one of the major impediments to stable and predictable funding is constantly changing tuition policies every few years. In the last few years tuition was set as a percent of the cost of instruction, there was a 7 percent cap on tuition, institution tuition-setting authority was authorized, and tuition was connected to Global Challenge State funding.

Mr. Francis stated that tuition policy is largely driven by the budget and that public higher education institutions in Washington experienced some of the largest decreases in funding in the nation between 2008 and 2012. This resulted in the Legislature allowing double digit increases in tuition during those years. Only one institution exercised tuition-setting authority and only for one year. He thanked the committee for the investment made in higher education in 2013 to reverse that impact. He said that what has changed is that students now shoulder the majority of the cost of attending a university and that this is the basis for the joint request of the public baccalaureate institutions of \$198 million proposal that would, among other things, hold tuition steady for another two-year period.

Austin Wright-Pettibone, representing the Associated Students (University of Washington), stated that tuition policy should take into account affordability while maintaining quality. Mr. Wright-Pettibone emphasized that the best from of financial aid is low tuition. He stated that tuition-setting authority should be returned to the Legislature and college should be defined as affordable when a student can attend school working a maximum of 20 hours a week during the school year and 40 hours during the summer can graduate without debt.

College Affordability

On January 21, the **House Higher Education Committee** held a work session on college affordability. Rachelle Sharpe (WSAC) presented on the State Need Grant and the College Bound Scholarship program. The SNG presentation outlined the changes in program policy over time. Ms. Sharpe noted that the SNG is a critical strategy for meeting the state's education attainment goals. The committee

reviewed the Interactive Affordability Model, developed jointly by UW Professor Jim Fridely in partnership with WSAC. The model is designed to show the relationship between state funding, tuition policy, and the impact on student debt. Representatives of the state's students' association presented on the impact of tuition on affordability and emphasized that increasing hours of work to afford college can negatively impact student success.

Postsecondary education needs of the computer science and maritime industries.

On January 20, the **House Higher Education Committee** held a work session on degrees and credentials that lead to good job. The session focused on computer science and maritime education and careers. Presenters included Dave Wallace of the Workforce Training and Education Coordinating Board; Michael Schutzler of the Washington Technology Industry Association; Microsoft recruiter Becky Tucker; Google Manager Lysandra Donigian responsible for Tech Student Outreach in North America; and Henry M. Levy, Wissner-Slivka Chair and Department Chairman, Computer Science & Engineering, University of Washington. Several speakers outlined the high need for computer science graduates with annual demand outstripping supply of graduates from our state's higher education institutions. Professor Levy asserted that what distinguishes the Seattle Washington is the 48,440 "Software Developers, Applications" and the 7,560 "Software Developers, Systems Software" which are more, in total, than Silicon Valley. In 2014 UW awarded 300 computer science degrees and are funded to grow to 375. He said they would like to reach 600. He noted also that 30 percent of CS students in their program are female. Of the 30 percent of transfer students from community and technical colleges, 40 percent gain baccalaureate degrees in CS. More than three-quarters of our students are Washington residents, and more than three-quarters of the CS graduates remain in the state.

Maritime Industry presenters included Joshua Berger, Washington Maritime Federation; Ann Avary, Center of Excellence for Marine Manufacturing and Technology; Peter Granger, WA Sea Grant / University of Washington; and Wendy Brant, Safe Boats International.

Healthcare

On January 22, the **Senate Higher Education Committee** held work sessions on Washington State University and University of Washington medical school education proposals, the health care workforce shortage, and graduate medical education.

Hearings

On January 19 the **House Education Committee** held hearings on two bills (<u>HB 1031</u> (Johnson) and <u>HB 1081</u> (Sullivan)) that would expand College in the High School (CHS) beyond grades 11 and 12 to the 10th grade. The proposals are similar except that the Johnson proposal also extends the requirement

that CHS-participating school districts provide general information about the program to all students and their parents and guardians in grade 9 in addition to grades 10 through 12.

On January 20, **House Higher Education Committee** held hearings on a bill that would create the Washington advanced higher education loan program (<u>HB HB1030</u> (Johnson)) and another bill that eliminates the parent or guardian approval requirement for the College Bound Scholarship pledge (<u>HB 1236</u> (Ortiz-Self)).

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Week 4 Legislative Update February 2 - 6, 2015

Proposal Directing WSAC to Assess Regional Needs Heard in House Higher Education

A proposal sponsored by Representative Pollet, Vice Chair of the House Higher Education Committee, <u>HB 1482</u>, requires the Washington Student Achievement Council (WSAC) to conduct a regional study. The study would assess the gap between higher education demand and the capacity of higher education institutions to meet demand. Representative Pollet asked how Washington is going to ensure that every resident has the opportunity to access our higher education system.

Jane Sherman, the Associate Director for Academic Policy, spoke in support of the bill. She stated that one of the most important contributions WSAC can make is to seriously wrestle with the question of our state's unmet higher education needs. Sherman articulated a concern about defining capacity that was echoed by Jan Yoshiwara, Deputy Director for the Education Division of the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges. Yoshiwara suggested that instead of emphasizing capacity, all higher education institutions should be challenged to identify what they can do collaboratively to meet the needs of students in various regions of the state. Marc Webster, WSAC Senior Fiscal Policy Advisor, noted that the bill is focused on two very important questions:

- 1. What would a system that is prepared to meet the challenges of the attainment goals look like?
- 2. How do we change, and what policies are needed to meet the ambitious state attainment goals?

Costs, Transparency and Efficiency

Two proposals by Ranking Leader of the House Higher Education Committee, Representative Zeiger, focus on costs and expenditures in higher education. During the hearing on <u>HB 1500</u>, concerning a study of higher education cost drivers, Representative Zeiger commented that when we are looking at complex, large state systems, we have to know what's driving costs.

Representative Zeiger's second proposal focuses on expenditures. <u>HB 1400</u> would require the Education Research & Data Center (ERDC) at the Office of Financial Management to post additional information on its data dashboard require ERDC to post the department-level budget of each public higher education institution, including budget planning and expenditures.

A bill sponsored by Representative Haler, <u>HB 1147</u>, directs the Washington State Institute for Public Policy to conduct a study on transitioning to a three-track admission system for public institutions of higher education on a semester calendar; and a four-track admission system for public institutions of higher education on a quarter calendar. The proposal is based on Brigham Young University-Idaho's transition to a three-track admission system.

Substitute Bill related to College Bound Signatures Referred to Rules

An amended version of a bill sponsored by Representative Ortiz-Self, <u>SHB 1236</u> passed out of the Higher Education Committee and has been referred to Rules. The substitute bill maintains the parent or guardian witness requirement for the College Bound Scholarship pledge, but allows a school administrator or counselor to witness the pledge when a parent or guardian is unavailable.

Senate Work Session on Independent College of Washington

The Senate Higher Education Committee held a work session with the Independent Colleges of Washington on February 3rd. Tom Fitzsimmons, Vice President of the Independent Colleges of Washington (ICW), stated that the ten universities represented by ICW enroll nearly 40,000 students each year. The ICW schools confer 20 percent of Washington's baccalaureate degrees on an annual basis. and they also have the capacity to serve about 20 percent more students over the next 8 years, which would be an additional 4,000 students. Fitzsimmons noted the importance of the State Need Grant and State Work Study program within their system.

STEM Work Session

The Senate Trade and Economic Development committee held a work session on STEM education initiatives. Randy Spaulding of WSAC presented with Dave Wallace of the Workforce Board and Tina Bloomer of the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges on the need for individuals with higher education credentials. These needs were assessed for the WSAC and Workforce Board joint-agency report, *A Skilled and Educated Workforce*. Caroline King of Washington STEM presented on her non-profit organization and also the Governor's STEM Innovation Alliance.

Hearing on Veterans Residency Bills

The Senate Higher Education Committee held a hearing on Governor-request bill <u>SB 5355</u>, which would modify the definition of "resident student" to comply with the federal requirements established by the veterans Choice Act of 2014.

Dual Credit

A substitute of <u>HB 1031</u> passed out of the House Education committee and has been referred to Rules. The bill expands the dual-credit program, College in the High School (CHS), beyond grades 11 and 12 to grade 10. It also requires participating school districts to provide general information about CHS programs to students in grade 9 and their parents. The substitute bill adds a provision that CHS course credit must apply toward degree requirements at the Evergreen State College.

A public hearing was held in the House Education Committee on the OFM-Request bill <u>HB 1546</u>— Concerning dual-credit opportunities provided by Washington state's public institutions of higher education. During the hearing, representatives of Central Washington University, Eastern Washington

University and the Tacoma School District expressed concerns that the proposal would diminish opportunities to offer dual credit through the Running Start in the High School model. Representatives of the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges, the Workforce Board, WSAC and the League of Education Voters were supportive of the options. WSAC's Maddy Thompson noted that the proposal was less expansive than WSAC's original proposal but still represented a step forward. Among other provisions, OFM's proposal would prioritize low-income students to receive college credit for College in the High School programs. The Senate companion bill (SB 5086) has not yet passed out of committee.

Inside Olympia Interview with House Higher Education Leaders

TVW's Austen Jenkins interviewed House Higher Education Committee Chair Representative Drew Hansen and Ranking Leader Representative Hans Zeiger for Inside Olympia. They discussed their higher education priorities and the need for new investments in higher education.

Representative Hansen noted, "We are going to be making major investments in keeping tuition low, in high demand degrees—particularly computer science—and in innovations to help students to get through college, like in college and career advising." When Jenkins asked whether keeping tuition flat and investing in higher education was realistic, Hansen said it was realistic if there is a willingness to consider revenue options. "If we want a world class education system, if we want affordable education then you have to pay for it," Hansen stated.

Representative Zeiger referenced the large decreases in higher education funding in 2009 of \$500 million and again in 2011 of \$600 million. He noted that in 2013 the Legislature froze tuition and increased funding by 12 percent, but stated that many middle class families are continuing to struggle to pay their higher education bills.
