Week 9

House of Origin Cutoff

The deadline to consider bills in the House of Origin was March 11. Unless bills are considered "Necessary to Implement the Budget," all bills that did not pass out of their House of origin died.

State Need Grant Minimum GPA Proposal Did Not Pass Out of Senate

<u>SSB5547</u>, sponsored by Senator Bailey, did not pass out of the Senate. The proposal would have placed a minimum GPA in statute and increased it to 2.25 for initial renewal and 2.5 GPA for subsequent renewals with special provisions to accommodate The Evergreen State College, which does not award GPAs.

SB 5638, sponsored by Senator Hasegawa, passed the Senate and has been referred to the House Higher Education Committee. Under the bill, students who are enrolled or accepted for enrollment for at least three quarter credits, or the equivalent semester hours, in a qualifying higher education program are eligible for the State Need Grant. This has been directed in budget for the last two biennia and this change would make the eligibility permanent.

Residency for Veterans for the Purpose of Tuition

Both companion bills in the House and Senate related to veterans residency <u>E2SHB 1825</u> (Kilduff) and <u>SSB 5355</u> (Bailey) passed their houses of origin and have been referred to the opposite chamber. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs had approved both versions for compliance with Section 702 of the Choice Act of 2014.

Dual Credit

The dual credit bill proposal <u>E2SHB1546</u> passed out of the House with two amendments.

- 1. One amendment offered by Rep. Reykdal "removes an extraneous reference to smarter balanced practice and training assessments in the intent section."
- 2. The other offered by Rep. Orwall does the following:
 - Adds a null and void clause (related to provisions clearly delineating between College in the High School (CHS) and Running Start (RS)) that prohibits RS courses from being offered in the high school if the CHS per-credit subsidies are not funded by June 30, 2015.
 - Regardless of the null and void, retains changes found in the underlying second substitute regarding: adding the Student Achievement Council to the dual credit rulemaking group; dual credit notification to ninth and tenth graders; eligibility of tenth graders for CHS; allowing Guaranteed Education Tuition credits to be used to pay for CHS and RS; and CHS credit recognition.

Medical Program Offerings

<u>SHB 1559</u> and Senate companion <u>SSB5487</u> each passed out of their respective chambers. The bills provide that Washington State University (WSU) may offer and teach medicine and forestry as major lines of study, and authorize the Board of Regents at WSU to establish, operate, and maintain a school of medicine.

Tuition Proposals

The Tuition bill, sponsored by Senator Braun <u>ESSB95954</u>, which would reduce tuition among other provisions, passed off the Senate floor. Please see the link to the bill page for a full summary of provisions.

The Senate adopted a striking amendment (Braun) and an amendment to the striking amendment (Cleveland), making the following changes:

- 1. In relation to tuition reductions:
 - Reduces tuition in two phases for the first and second year of the biennium as follows Specifies that in FY 2016, the budget shall set the tuition operating fee between the
 current 2014-15 academic year levels and 14% of state average wage for UW/WSU, 10%
 for the regional universities, and 6% for the SBCTC.
 - For FY 2017, the tuition operating fee is 14% of the state average wage for UW/WSU, 10% for the regional universities, and 6% for the SBCTC. Clarifies that the total payout value of each GET account on the effective date of this section shall not be decreased or diluted as a result of the bill's change in tuition policy.
- 2. In relation to the GET program:
 - Provides the GET committee and governing body flexibility to make one-time
 adjustments each year based on the potential that the tuition operating fee may be
 different in FY 2016 from FY 2017. Eliminates the null & void clause. FISCAL IMPACT
 Analysis of Senate Committee Services: Cost ranges between \$112M and \$232M
 depending on whether the budget fully funds FY 2016 or keeps tuition at 2014-15 levels.
 - And the amendment to the striking amendment clarifies that the GET governing body
 and committee allow current account holders to redeem the same dollar value in a year
 as they were able to do prior to the tuition policy change.

There are some similarities and differences between SSB5954 and the OFM-request bill sponsored by Rep. Haler that passed the House

SHB1696:

- Returns tuition-setting authority for resident undergraduate students at public baccalaureate institutions to the Legislature to set a cap in the operating budget.
- Removes statutory authority for differential tuition.
- Provides that any institution that exercised tuition-setting authority above certain levels must continue financial aid mitigation.
- Adds additional income brackets to the annual reports required by four-year institutions that raise tuition beyond the levels assumed in the operating budget.

- Repeals certain provisions as follows:
 - The requirement for OFM to report annually the total per-student funding level and undergraduate tuition that each represent the sixtieth percentile of funding and tuition for similar institutions of higher education in the Global Challenge states.
 - The requirement for public baccalaureate institutions to negotiate institutional performance plans with the OFM.
 - The requirement that colleges and universities must collaborate with student associations to make every effort to communicate the American Opportunity Tax Credit and other credits to students and report on the effectiveness of these methods.
