Affordability

WSAC Recommendation	Final Legislative Budget
Maintain the commitment to College Bound Scholarship students.	<i>\$45 M</i> for expected caseload in the College Bound Scholarship.
Fully fund the State Need Grant program to serve all eligible students, restore one-time funding and ensure grants keep pace with tuition.	 \$38 M to State Need Grant to: Maintain 2015-17 service levels. Increase awards with tuition. Increase award amounts for students attending four-year private non-profit schools to the award level of research schools. \$12 M to serve an additional 875 eligible students in each year of the 2017-19 biennium.
Maintain a stable, <i>predictable tuition</i> policy.	<i>Tuition increases at 2.2% and 2.0%,</i> per College Affordability Program (CAP) at public institutions.
Provide ample funding for higher education to <i>maintain quality</i> .	<i>\$10 M</i> in inflation adjustments to the CAP tuition reductions from 2015-17 budget.
Maintain state match for private donations raised for the <i>Washington State Opportunity Scholarship</i> and expand eligibility to technical degrees.	<i>\$15 M</i> to match private donations for current program. Eligibility not expanded.

	<i>\$27 M</i> increase for transitional bilingual program for middle and high school students.
	<i>\$1.5 M</i> to SBCTC to expand MESA program, supporting secondary students in math/science and engineering.
