- Jobs for the Future (JFF): Project ACCESS Accelerating Career Connections and Employment Success Strategies
 - 10 Community and Technical Colleges
 - \$300,000 over a 2-year period
 - Funding to strengthen, expand, and scale effective programming that connects community and technical college learners facing systemic barriers to economic advancement to paid work-based learning experiences and/or quality jobs
 - Proposal due: January 17,2025
 - Project period: April 2025 June 2027



- WSAC Native American Apprenticeship Assistance Program (NAAAP)
 - Block grants for Federal Recognized Tribes in WA State
 - Average award per awardee: \$50,000-\$150,000
 - Award value per apprentice: \$10,000 (max award)
 - Funds must be expended by June 30, 2025

THE POWER OF PARTNERSHIPS

- Support with postsecondary enrollment in the community and at the CTC
- Wraparound support for students
- CBOs specialize in services that colleges don't have resources or capacity to assist
- CBO's services are not contingent on credit enrollment
- Grow a student's network of supportive relationships





"Colleges can't fully support students on their own or in a vacuum. **So** many of the challenges that students are facing are not purely academic. We've found that partnering with Northwest Education Access has been invaluable for students getting personalized attention from an education advocate that can't really be replicated inside the college. SUSTAIN COLLABORATIVE PARTNERSHIPS

- Establish a referral system
 - email introduction
 - warm hand off
- Have dedicated space and time on-campus and at CBOs
- Have ongoing communication & collaboration
 - shared space between college and CBO staff
 - regular check-ins scheduled
 - shared progress trackers
 - database sharing agreement
- Connect students at risk of disconnection to appropriate CBO for **more comprehensive** support
- Effectively message resources available to students on-campus and in their community








"The CBO and college collaboration is a crucial piece of student support. It creates a seamless way to extend the services offered by the college in a more targeted, relationship-based way. Having a space on campus for CBO staff, as well as college administrative support in maintaining established relationships is vital for the collaboration to work. ...staff can refer students needing more support, freeing them up to serve more students overall. Perhaps most importantly, CBO staff provide a connection to services like housing and childcare that may not be offered through the college but have a direct effect on a student's ability to continue. This off campus support can help address needs as they arise rather than after it's too late."



Greater Collective Impact



(Re)Connecting more young people & adult learners to opportunities (decreasing disconnection)

Reconnect to Opportunity (ReOpp) Following youth-led design, ReOpp continues to refer young people to education and employment programs throughout King County, with near peer Reengagement Specialists

National Evaluation Results - Northwest Education Access/Open Doors programs Urban Institute's evaluation revealed that participants in South King County were 3 times as likely to enroll in postsecondary education when working with NW Education Access, comared. to control sites. Participants who were men of color were 7 times as likely to enroll.

Creating Paths for Change: Understanding Youth Disengagement and Reengagement

This report by Road Map Project partners at the UW School of Social Work and Northwest Education Access aims to drive change by amplifying the experiences of students who have been failed by the systems created to serve them. Students share what led them to disengage and recommendations on how to help them succeed.

Latinx Youth Reengagement Insights - Latinx young people are disproportionately represented in reengagement programs and the number of young people who disengage. This report provides insight and recommendations directly from Latinx youth in our region about how we can better serve them, including careerfocused and culturally relevant curriculum.
