




Washington's Postsecondary Attainment Goal

SB 5785—Modifying WA Grant and CBS Awards

• Establishes new **WA Grant income eligibility thresholds** for the 2025–26 academic year (AY) and beyond:

Median Family Income (MFI) Range	Award % (up to full public tuition and fees)	Qualifying Income for Household of Four in 2025–26 AY
0–60	100%	\$78,500
61–65	60%	\$85,000
66–70	50%	\$91,500
71–75	24.5%	\$98,500
76–100	10%	\$131,000
