Consent of the Agenda

Executive Director Update

Presenter: Michael Meotti

- Michael provided an update on two agency request legislation proposals that do not involve spending money but aim to protect students. This is in response to the expectation of less student-friendly regulations.
- The first proposal sets standards for student loan servicers to better protect Washington's student borrowers.
- The second addresses school closures to ensure students can continue their education seamlessly.

Chair Report

Presenter: Jeff Vincent

- Jeff Vincent acknowledged all the changes happening at both the state and federal level. He noted the importance of the Council being as effective as it can be going into the new session.
- Jeff mentioned that the Council is working to fill two vacancies; one student member and one Governor appointed member.

2026 Legislative and Budget Proposals

Presenters: Joel Anderson

Material: 2026 Legislative Proposals

- Joel explained that the Council is requesting \$1.25 million for fiscal year 2027 to partially restore funding for the Regional Challenge Grant program, which was eliminated in the last budget.
- The funding would help existing partnerships continue their work on increasing postsecondary enrollment, retention, and completion.
- He also presented a proposal to guarantee maximum WA Grant awards to former foster and unaccompanied homeless youth in the Passport to Careers program, which would have no additional cost since 99.5 percent of these students already receive the maximum award.
- Hannah Lodwick clarified that the RCG funding request would reduce the current 18
 percent cut to partnerships to approximately 9 percent, allowing them to continue
 essential strategies while still requiring lean approaches.

Action Taken on 2026 Legislative and Budget Proposals:

No motion brought forward on the proposal to restore RCG Funding.

Motion made to approve the proposal to guarantee WA Grant for former foster and unaccompanied homeless youth.

Washington Jobs Initiative

Presenters: Shannon Peterson and Shannon Ladymon

Materials: WJI Grant

- Shannon Peterson and Shannon Ladymon presented an overview of the Washington Jobs Initiative, a \$23.5 million federally funded program aiming to train 5,000 Washingtonians and place at least 3,150 in good jobs across high-demand industries.
- The initiative operates through four sub-awardees (Employment Security Department, Washington STEM, Office of Equity, and State Labor Council) and eight sectoral

- partnerships focusing on industries like advanced manufacturing, healthcare, and IT. Training is delivered through various providers, including community colleges, universities, and employers, with programs like Jumpstart and SEIU's Training Fund offering sector-specific training with wraparound services to ensure participant success.
- Shannon P. discussed the progress and challenges of a grant program across various sectors. In advanced manufacturing, cleantech, construction, healthcare, and IT, the program has successfully developed new training initiatives with strong employer partnerships. They focus on underserved populations, including young adults, justiceinvolved youth, and English language learners.
- Despite successes, challenges include industry-specific hiring slowdowns (Boeing strikes, tech layoffs), small training cohorts creating bottlenecks, and difficulties collecting participant outcome data.
- The sectors are implementing strategic shifts to address these challenges by expanding recruitment efforts for underserved participants and increasing employer outreach to improve job placement rates, including hiring additional business engagement staff and exploring opportunities with smaller employers and in rural regions.
- Shannon L. presented a cost analysis of their workforce development program, which showed they spend about \$2,700 per enrolled participant, like WIOA programs.
- The cost per job placement varies significantly across sectors, with construction having the lowest cost (\$3,700) due to immediate apprenticeship placements, while the newer Clean Tech program has the highest cost (\$18,000) due to startup expenses and smaller scale.
- Shannon L. emphasized two key learnings: the importance of industry alignment with employer commitments for successful job placements, and the value of wraparound services for participant retention, with most funds being spent on tuition assistance and career navigation support.
- Mike discussed WSAC's commitment to improving data-tracking capabilities to demonstrate the impact of postsecondary pathways. He highlighted their evaluation research team and partnerships with organizations like MDRC.
- Shannon L. mentioned they are working on sharing learnings through storytelling, conferences, and meetings with other grantees, with a focus on collecting data about wraparound services.
