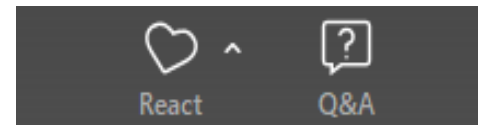

Passport provides eligible students with:

- Scholarship valued at \$2,000 for the 2025-26 academic year
- Support services through the college
- Students may participate in college or an apprenticeship or pre-apprenticeship program





PASSPORT STUDENT ELIGIBILITY

Passport to Careers Eligibility:

- Students who experienced state, tribal, ICPC, or federal **foster care** at any point after age 13.
- Students who experienced **unaccompanied homelessness** on or after July 1 of the prior academic year.



PASSPORT STUDENT ELIGIBILITY

- ▣ Complete the FAFSA or WASFA
- ▣ Attend an approved institution in WA at least half-time
- ▣ Washington resident
- ▣ Make satisfactory academic progress toward their degree
- ▣ Enroll in college before age 22
- ▣ Student has 18 QER
- ▣ May not pursue a degree in theology

Passport Addendum to Participation Agreement in State Aid Programs

- Institutions elect to provide individualized support services to Passport students.
- Forty-six colleges have developed a student support plan through:
 - Campus leadership commitment
 - Designated support staff (DSS)
 - Identifying staff in financial aid
 - Reviewing student financial aid, ensuring all resources are utilized and minimizing a reliance on student loans
 - Connecting with social services and Independent Living Providers



PASSPORT AGREEMENT

Institutions review and update their Passport Student Success Plan annually.

Support services include:

- Housing/basic needs support
- Food
- Emergency assistance
- Transportation
- Books/technology

The State of Washington created the Passport to Careers program through RCW 28B.117. The Passport to Careers program is administered by the Washington Student Achievement Council (WSAC) and helps current and former foster youth and unaccompanied homeless youth enroll, persist, and complete a postsecondary education, apprenticeship or pre-apprenticeship. WSAC provides institutions with financial incentives for agreeing to have a viable plan for supporting Passport students by:

- **Leadership Commitment:** Create a lasting institutional commitment to serve current and former foster youth and unaccompanied homeless youth by designating a president, chancellor, vice-president, or other position of leadership to advocate and take responsibility for the program's success.
- **Designated Campus Support Staff:** Designate a knowledgeable "home base" staff person who can direct students in the areas of financial aid, academic guidance, personal issues, and career counseling / advising. The designated staff person will also be responsible for preparing campus personnel in these areas to assist referred Passport students.
- **Financial aid:** Review each Passport student's individual budget to recognize their actual living expenses and tailor the financial aid package, to utilize all available resources to meet the student's full need and minimize reliance on loans.

"Funds are provided for student scholarships, and for incentive payments to the colleges they attend for individualized student support services which may include, but are not limited to, college and career advising, counseling, tutoring, costs incurred for students while school is not in session, personal expenses, health insurance, and emergency services."

EMERGENCY FUNDING

“Emergency financial assistance provided to the student for unexpected expenses that are a component of the student’s cost of attendance, and not otherwise considered when the student’s need is made, shall not be treated as other financial assistance.”

- Funding utilized as emergency financial assistance for students is not factored into need-based aid calculations.
- Examples could include food, housing, materials, etc.
- Colleges must have a policy and process for students to request assistance and document the request, including the unexpected expense for the student.

PROGRAM BUDGET

Legislature eliminated supplemental program funding for Passport.

WSAC will utilize funds from SETA account to help make up for half of what was eliminated.

2024 STUDENT SURVEY RESULTS

- 71% attended college full-time (79% in 23-24)
- 27% were not aware of the support available to them through Passport.
- 26% would like to be contacted by their Passport support a few times each quarter. Another 25% said they would like to hear from them at least once per quarter.
- 82% said their Passport support person was important to their college support experience.
- 49% needed help with financial aid. Another 47% needed assistance with covering tuition or fees.
- 83% said the support they received helped them persist in college.
- 68% indicated they will continue in college during the 2025-26 academic year.
- 71% said their financial aid covered their educational expenses.
- 38% enrolled in college because of Passport. Additionally, 46% said they were more likely to stay enrolled because of Passport.
- 65% of respondents are working. Of these, 41% are working more than 20 hours per week.
 - 13%: more than 40 hours per week

PROGRAM REMINDERS

- Administrators are asked to request funding each quarter. Please do not delay payment requests.
- Passport students receive priority funding SWS.
- Program Manual includes a section for Passport support staff.





TASKS AND TIMELINES

August 2025 – Passport DSS and FAA complete the 2024-25 end of year report for student support funds.

November 2025 - WSAC analysis on Passport enrolled student headcount, processing student support funds to eligible institutions for the 2025-26 academic year.

June 2026 – Institutions begin signing Passport addendums for participating as an institution with a viable plan for supporting Passport students.

September 2026 – Updated Student Support Plans due to WSAC. DSS primarily responsible but may consult with FAA.



2025-26 STUDENT SUPPORT FUND REPORTING

- Institutions report annually – sent to institutions in August
- Report questions are being updated
- Vetted by the Passport Leadership Team, data and research subcommittee.
- Passport DSS will receive a link to the report, FAA's may be asked to provide some of the information requested.

PASSPORT TO APPRENTICESHIPS

- In general, for non-campus based apprenticeship programs.
- Assists students participating in a registered apprenticeship or pre-apprenticeship programs.
- Covers occupational-specific costs.
 - Tuition, fees, work clothes, rain gear, boots, and occupation-related tools.

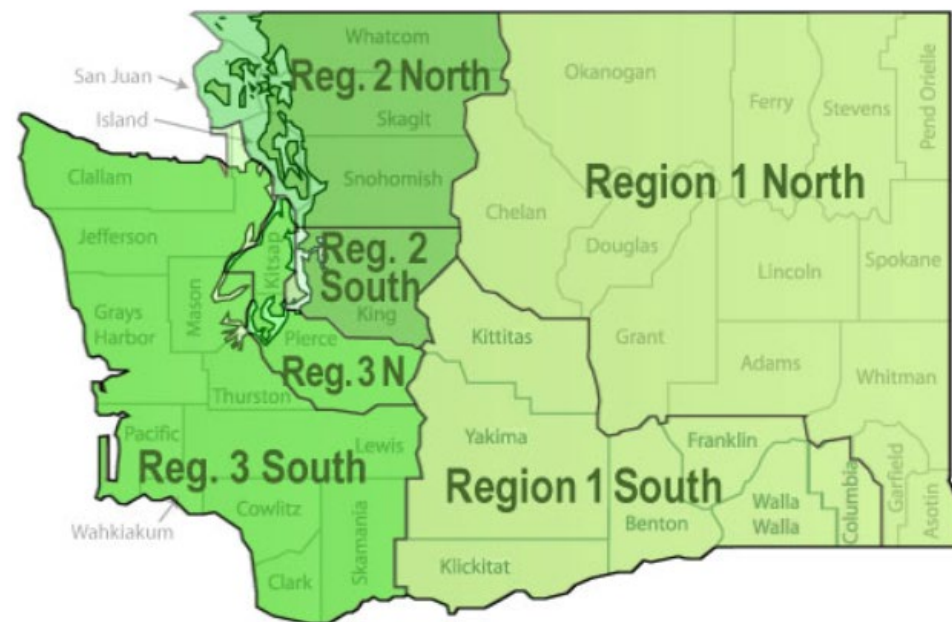




EARLY OUTREACH – SETUP PROGRAM

Assists youth in successfully making the transition from high school to postsecondary enrollment, career, or service.

- Five providers throughout Washington:
 - Serve 284 students each year
 - Provide case management to complete developmental tasks to increase high school and postsecondary success
 - Facilitate youth access to appropriate school and local resources
 - Collaborate with Treehouse staff

Education and Training Voucher (ETV) Program

- Provides financial assistance to eligible students to attend an accredited college or university, vocational or technical college.
- Maximum ETV award is \$5,000/academic year.
- Awards are unique to each student and are determined based on unmet financial need.
- ETV can be used if attending college in another state.
- Dual credit option for High School Students (\$2,000/academic year).



ETV is the Cherry on the Financial Aid Cupcake



ETV is the last source of aid applied to a student's Cost of Attendance.

Many ETV students also receive:

- Pell Grant (must receive after applying for FAFSA)
- Passport (award varies)
- WA College Grant (award varies)
- College Bound (award varies)
- Governors Scholarship (students must apply by 11/30)

ETV Eligibility

To be eligible for the ETV program, the student must meet at least one of the following criteria:

- You are 15 to 20 years old, currently involved in a dependency action in a Washington State or tribal court, in the care and custody of DCYF or an ICW agency and in foster care.
- You are 18 to 20 years old and have aged out of state or tribal care. Youth who have aged out of foster care in a state other than Washington may also be eligible to apply.
- You were adopted or entered guardianship with a relative on or after the age of 15.
- If you participated and used ETV funds prior to age 21, you may be eligible to age 26; not to exceed a total of 15 semesters or 20 quarters.

Other requirements:

- If ETV funds have not been used before turning 21, students are no longer eligible for the program.
- Must be eligible for aid and have an unmet need.
- Enrolled at least half-time and take at least one 100-level course.
- Maintain satisfactory academic progress (2.0 GPA or higher).



Important Dates

- **October 1** FAFSA opens for the next academic year, 2026-2027.
- **January 1** Registration opens for ETV for the next academic year, 2026-2027.
- ***April 30** ETV priority deadline

Running Start/Dual Credit Students

Running Start students are eligible for up to **\$2,000** an academic year.

Some suggested expenditures:

Books and supplies | School Fees | Transportation | Parking pass | Gas/Car repairs

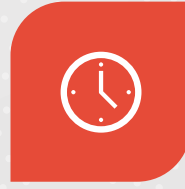
How do they receive their funds? They must:

- Take at least 6 credits and one 100 level class or higher.
- Have a statewide vendor account (can be student or caregiver). ETV will disperse funds directly to the student after they return their spending plan.

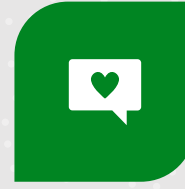
